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How are we preparing students for the future?



“We are currently preparing students for jobs that don’t yet exist . . . using technologies that haven’t yet been invented . . . in order to solve problems we don’t even know are problems yet.”

- Many of today’s most in-demand jobs didn’t exist 10 years ago.
- Some researchers predict that 65% of students today will hold jobs that don’t yet exist.



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How are we preparing students for the future?

At Trumpington Community College, our aim is to provide a **high-quality curriculum** which bring out the best in our students and prepares them for success in life.

Our curriculum is designed to:

- Provide children with the core knowledge they need for success in education and later life
- To maximise their cognitive development
- To develop the whole person and talents of the individual
- To allow all children to become active and economically self-sufficient citizens.



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How are we preparing students for the future?

- By teaching our curriculum well, we develop pupils' cultural capital
 - *“the essential knowledge that pupils need to be educated citizens, introducing them to the best that has been thought and said and helping to engender an appreciation of human creativity and achievement.”* (DFE National Curriculum, 2014)
- At Trumpington Community College, students will:
 - Experience a broad, deep and knowledge rich curriculum
 - Be literate and numerate, have high expectations for their achievement and build their character
 - Develop their cultural, social, moral, mental and physical development
 - forge secure foundations for progression



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Expectations of Education today

- Your child must remain in Education or Training until they are 18.
- The government believes that adults will be 22/23 years old when before they embark upon a career.
- As adults, your children will probably change career 2-3 times during their adult lives and have 10-14 jobs by the age of 38.
- They will work to the age of 70+ before retirement.
- The days of a lifelong career with a single company or within one industry have gone.



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New Style GCSEs

- Courses are more rigorous
- There is more content
- Few courses contain tiers (higher/foundation)
- All GCSEs are linear courses with final exams.
- Few subjects have coursework (only the Arts, DT, Food)
- Little chance to resit
 - Except a requirement to re-sit English Language and Maths in post-16 college if a 4 is not achieved.


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GCSEs & CNAT qualifications

Grades for Cambridge Nationals and for GCSEs align at key points.

Level 1 covers GCSE grades 3-1 (or D-G) and Level 2 GCSE grades 9-4 (or A*-C).

- The bottom of a Level 1 Pass is aligned to GCSE grade 1
- The bottom of a Level 2 Pass is aligned to GCSE grade 4
- The bottom of a Level 2 Distinction is aligned to grade 7



What is EBacc?

- The EBacc (English Baccalaureate) is the basis of the National Curriculum, and our curriculum.
- These subjects represent an ambitious curriculum for all students. We structure our KS4 around these, to ensure that all students have the qualifications to succeed.
 - English Literature and Language
 - Maths
 - two science GCSEs
 - a language
 - and a humanity (History or Geography)

Be aware

The Options form will ask students to select 4 courses from the options list, in order of preference

- If a course is oversubscribed, selections will be made on the basis of meeting the options deadline, good attendance, good behaviour.
- It is not a 'first come, first served' approach – all submissions are considered equally if the deadline is met. If the deadline is missed, your preferences will be considered last.
- If a course has too few students to run, the back-up choices will help us place each student.
- Conversations will be had with any students for whom this is the case, or where there are other queries.

- Additional & Further Maths
- A bespoke programme with guided choices for some students for whom full programme of GCSEs is not suitable.
- Home Languages
- Happy to discuss our provision and options for particular students.



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Completing the form

- When choices have been made, you'll need to complete the online form that will be sent to you tomorrow. Booklets will be given to students.
- Students will be given their Guidance Meeting appointment time with Senior Leaders over the next couple of weeks.
- The deadline for completion is **midday, Monday 4th March 2024**

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Options Schedule from now

- Year 9 Options Information Evening – 31.1.22
- Presentations, booklet and online form sent out – 31.1.23

 - Don't make a choice straight away, there is plenty of time until this point.

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■ What if a course is oversubscribed?

- It depends by how many students. If we are able to run two classes, we will do so. We do this currently for Business Studies in Year 11.

■ What if a course is undersubscribed?

- We aim to run all the courses we can, and therefore we have no firm number for how small a class may be. We accept that we have teachers for all the subjects, that they are important and that we are a small school. Whether a course runs or not can alter depending on the interests of the year group, eg. there is no music class in Year 11, but there is one in Year 10.
